



## Total Number of Fall Classes—2008-2012







Fall Distribution of Courses by Instructional Mode




## Fall Enrollment by Instructional Mode







## Historical Fall Enrollment—2003-2012




## Fall Enrollment Growth by Year-Fall 2003-2012




#### Basis of Admission—Fall 2012






#### Credit Student Enrollment by Age Group—Fall 2006-2012




## Credit Student Enrollment by Residency—Fall 2008-2012




#### Credit Student Enrollment by Ethnicity—Fall 2010-2012




## Credit Student Enrollment by Gender-Fall 2008-2012




## Credit Student Enrollment by Classification—Fall 2010-2012




## Credit Student Enrollment by Status—Fall 2010-2012




## Credit Student Enrollment by Major-Fall 2010-2012




#### Fall/Spring Credit Student Enrollment by Academic Year






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## Annual Unduplicated Enrollment



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#### Percent of Students Receiving Pell Grants






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#### Total Degrees and Certificates Awarded—2008-2012



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
## Total Degrees Awarded—2008-2012

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
## Total Certificates Awarded—2008-2012




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#### Student Persistence After One Year




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#### Student Persistence After Two Years






#### Tuition and Fees 1






#### Percentage of Hours Taught by FT/PT Faculty


